



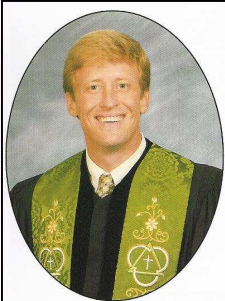

The Power of Christ

Dear Friends,

It should come as no surprise that one of our favorite vacation destinations is Disney World, a fact due in part to the two active young boys running around our home. I went there several times as a child and can still remember quite vividly the very first time I rode Space

Mountain, which is a roller coaster hidden within a mountainous structure located in what Disney affectionately calls Tomorrow Land. I remember standing in line with my father and hearing him tell me that, although he had ridden Space Mountain once before, it looked a whole lot worse than it really was. A few short minutes later, I realized that my father's memory was beginning to fade.

Actually, one of the less thrilling rides proved to be my favorite - The Haunted House. The ride itself was certainly fun. Through special effects, it appeared as though ghosts were riding in the seat next to you; but as enjoyable as the ride was, how you were entertained while you waited in line was equally interesting.

There on the hillside as you weaved your way through a series of lines was a pretend cemetery. I loved trying to stick my head through the cemetery gate while straining my eyes to read the playful epitaphs on each stone.

I can still remember some of them to-

day: "Dear departed Brother Dave, he chased a bear into a cave;" or "Rest in peace cousin Huet, we all know you didn't do it." And my favorite, "Here lies Wathel R. Bender, he rode to glory on a fender."

If you attended one of our services on Easter morning, you know that we prayerfully considered the idea that, long before being set in stone, our epitaphs are mixed with the full breadth of life's experiences. If the truth be known, the things that matter the most to us are the very things that will be remembered about us.

I read a particularly moving obituary about a man named Jeffrey Lewis Calloway. "Jeff's first love was his soul mate Rachel, along with sweet daughters Alexandria and Gillian, and Dexter, his faithful dog. His countless achievements include the reading of thousands of bedtime stories, numerous wrestling matches, muffin making lessons, many camping trips, several monsters slain under the bed, a myriad of swimming holes explored, bushels of tomatoes harvested, endless late-night talks filled with hopes and dreams yet to be realized and hundreds of Sundays spent holding sleeping children on hard church pews. His passion was building. Up until the day of his death, he oversaw the renovation of the roof structure and kitchen on the old house where his family lives. His garden continues to flourish."

Thanks be to God, that in a simple garden tomb the world's central miracle took place, and from that empty tomb comes the

greatest epitaph of them all, "He Is Not Here!" And friends, that message continues to flourish. It flourishes as our lives testify to God's love, thereby demonstrating that the words "He is not here" are not simply words of the past, but that through the power of God they are a very present reality.

The Christian faith has endured because there are a multitude of people who make it impossible for you to forget that there are Christians in your midst. I have found that such a legacy of faith is not accomplished through pious words or deeds or from a cold or harsh legal standard of life, but solely through the power of Christ who rose triumphant from the dead.

How we witness to God's love in Christ comes in many different and faithful forms, but rest assured our witness doesn't have to be grandiose. Perhaps like Jeffrey Calloway, our testimony to God's grace occurs when we bring our children, or as many others as the Lord may call, to the place where we as the church gather to worship God and learn about our faith; for it is by grace through faith that we are assured that we share in Christ's victory over death.

"Tell me," said one of Martin Luther's enemies to him sneeringly, "tell me - when the whole world turns against you - Church, State, princes, people - where will you be then?"

"Where shall I be then?" responded Luther. "Why, then as now, in the hands of Almighty God!"

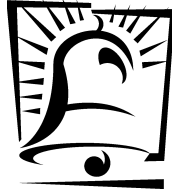

History of the FPC in Fernandina 150th Celebration

On Monday, April 14th, 7:30 p.m., the First Presbyterian Church membership is invited to attend the Duncan Lamont Clinch Historical Society's quarterly meeting as they present a "History of the First Presbyterian Church in Fernandina." The meeting will be held in the sanctuary, is open to the public, and free of charge.



"You are invited to hear the real story of Major Duryee and the bell and how a simple New England Meeting style structure evolved into the Church that has sheltered its congregation since the 1860. Susan Hardee Steger, the great-great granddaughter of Archibald Baker, the first minister to lead the congregation and close friend of David and Nannie Yulee will be our guide. Inspired by her mother, Suzanne Hardee, who served as the Church historian, Susan will be sharing her own perspective gained from exploring the original session minutes.

For any of you who might be curious about how our ancestors coped with the challenges of daily existence, Susan will enlighten you with practical tips provided by the "Houseskeeper's Assistant," a cookbook created by the women of the church in 1883. More than a story about a building, this is a story about people who had the vision and determination to create a community that we are privileged to call home." (Newsletter - Historical Society)

"If These Walls Could Talk" Christmas Memories

Looking back over my childhood years in the 1950s and 1960s, I recall Mrs. Pauline Delevan as one of our congregation's most memorable members. Though I knew few details of her life, I remember my mother telling me she played the cello--probably the only one between Atlanta and the music department at the University of Florida--an instrument that unfortunately met its doom when a chair collapsed upon it after she performed at a Women of the Church event. Since she was one of my Sunday School teachers when I was in elementary school, I do know for sure that she was the daughter of a Presbyterian missionary to Palestine in the 1920s, a generation before the 1947 UN partition of that country that created the state of Israel. Mrs. Delevan alternately fascinated us with ancient artifacts and memories of Palestinian life and reproached us for our hopelessness at memorizing the Children's Catechism. She labored valiantly every Sunday to transmit her rigorous Calvinist faith, while I and my classmates fidgeted in the un-air conditioned classroom and daydreamed about shedding our Sunday School clothes and heading for the beach.



Her most enduring contribution to the Church, however, was her gift of authentic Palestinian clothing that outfitted decades of children's Christmas pageants, including clothing for the Three Kings, various shepherds, Joseph, and, best of all, a costume for Mary that included a bridal headdress made of Palestinian coins. The traditional dress and embroidered woolen fabrics of 1920s Palestine matched our ideas of the dress of Jesus's time, with veils for the women and keffiyeh headdresses and long robes for the men. We were convinced that our Presbyterian Church's living nativity had the best costumes, if not the best acting, in the whole wide world.



Preparations for the pageant, which usually coincided with the Joy Gift offering, were always exciting. Mothers did last-minute mending of the fragile costumes that were probably fifty years old when I participated. Old hands tried to recall how the various mystifying pieces of clothing were arranged. The voluminous circular pantaloons worn by one of the Wise Men had to be drawn up by an endless drawstring, leading to much giggling, particularly during the year when the designated Wise Man showed up in argyle socks. On one memorable Christmas, I got to be Mary and wear the tinkling headdress, since I was still short enough to fit under the roof of the wooden stable, built too low for my taller high school friends. Fortunately, the pageant members didn't have speaking parts, but I'm sure I tried very hard to look suitably rapt and holy as I gazed down at the baby doll wrapped in swaddling cloths and laid in our Florida-built manger. As the years went by, the cherished costumes became more patches than fabric, and eventually, to my mother's great sorrow, had to be discarded. I am sure, though, that Mrs. Delevan, while still pondering the benefits of the Children's Catechism, continues to smile down on the children of the Church, while her wonderful gifts from Palestine still live in the memories of those of us who were blessed to help bring Mary, Joseph, the shepherds, and the Magi to life each Advent season.

- Plans are well underway for the 218th General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.), to be held June 21-28, in San Jose, California. The 2008 theme is "Do justice, love kindness, walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8).
- A new Internet Web site aimed at getting Presbyterians 50 and over has been launched by the National Health Ministries (NHM) office of the PCUSA. Participants for Clean Up Day March 15th, 2008

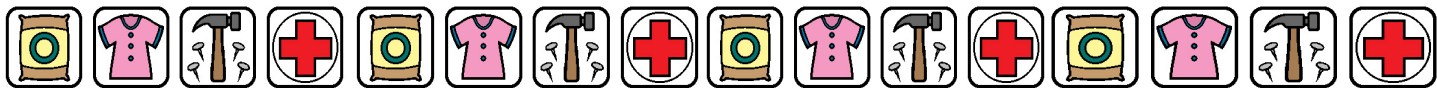

The ramp will allow a couple in Yulee to leave their trailer home. The materials for the ramp are being provided by our church's mission dollars, and the Lutheran church is providing some construction supervision and expertise. This is definitely a feel-good day for those hardworking Presbyterians who are first to sign up. Join the crew!

On June 23rd - 30th, several lucky First Pres members will be enjoying a wonderful Summer Vacation opportunity to serve the Lord and enjoy the beautiful mountains of West Virginia. There are two more spaces left if you would like to participate in this joint mission trip with Amelia Baptist Church to Matewan, West Virginia (of Hatfield and McCoy fame!).

We will be serving the Matewan Ministerial Association - the people and churches of Mingo County (among the bottom 10 counties in the nation in terms of economics). There is something for everyone to do.

Some things you may be involved in include: making repairs on dilapidated homes, painting, stocking a food pantry, sorting and folding clothes in the Clothes Closet, making up gift baskets for the homebound elderly, bringing vacation bible school to subsidized housing complexes, singing at an interdenominational service, doing a puppet show with a gospel message, making and packing lunches for the work crews, cooking dinner for the mission team, etc.

Total cost will be much lower than most weeklong summer vacations you've taken! Ball-park estimates are about \$250, mostly for lodging, plus pitching in for food and gas.

Our CT voted to use our remaining funds to send to the Little House Ministries. Thanks to Mary Hunt for researching the project.

We now have storage in the old Volunteer Room in Angel Davis Hall. We are collecting two items for the bazaar: clean panty hose and picture frames (up to 5x7 size). They may be placed in the PW box in the fellowship hall or taken to circle meetings, and Phyllis Rouse will gather them from there.



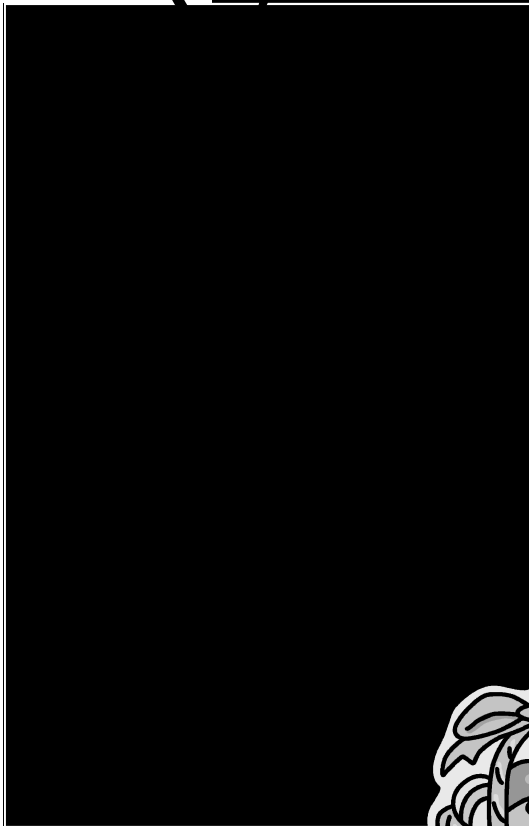
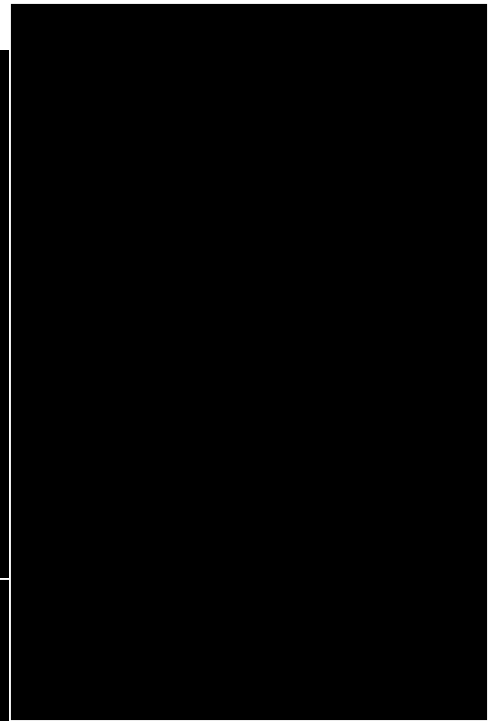
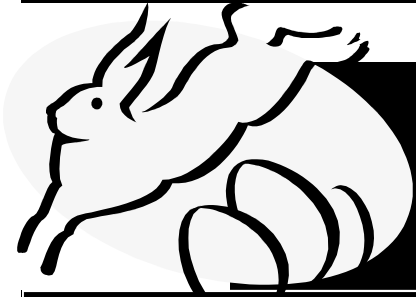
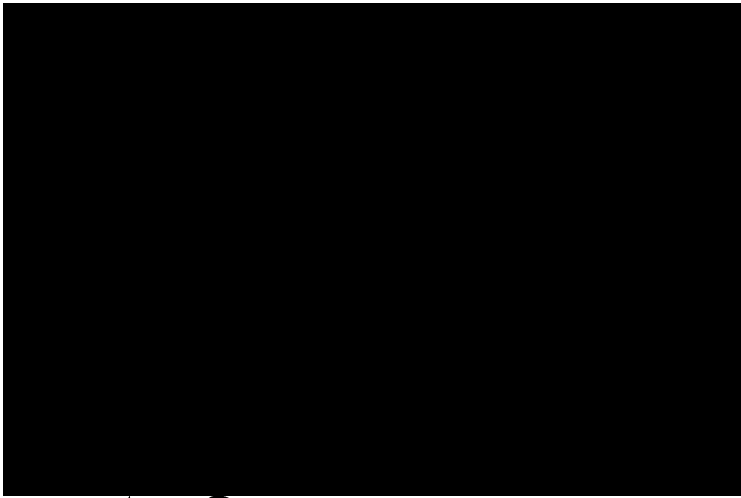
- ♥ Cookbooks are to be shipped around March 24th so be ready to grab them up when they come in. They will be \$16 a book.

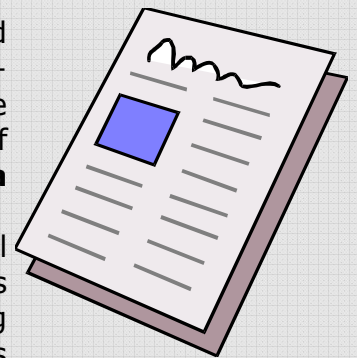
"I wish for all of you...
