Putting Our Trust in Christ

A New Year has begun - a new chapter within God's story of salvation that we have been blessed to write. So with all that is going on in your life and the life of the world, how do you find yourself feeling about the future as we stand on the threshold of the year of our Lord 2009?

How we relate to the future, that is, how we live into our calling of faith and hope and love, determines to a very great extent what we experience and how we greet the ever changing circumstances of life. Let me give you three examples:

First, when our Session adopted our 2009 "balanced" Budget in mid-December (you may recall that we adopted a deficit budget in 2008 and had anticipated having to do so for some time thereafter), I sensed a quiet confidence in the room: not confidence in ourselves, mind you, but rather a confidence in the richness of God's grace. Recently, when it became apparent that our income was going to exceed our expenses in 2008, a fact which was due in large part to our not yet having called an Associate Pastor, the Session gave an additional \$43,200 to the Mission Committee for immediate disbursement!

Secondly, I am happy to report to you that, while we may not have had our Associate Pastor in place last year, our Associate Pastor Nominating Committee (APNC) has asked the Session to call a meeting of the

congregation on Sunday, January 11, 2009, for the purpose of hearing its report; the Session has concurred. We eagerly anticipate our APNC's report, for it reflects nearly a year-long search for the person whom God has now called to serve in our midst: the one who will, by God's grace, help us to make the next chapter of our lives together better than all those that have preceded it.

Thirdly, our Session recently approved an overture to the St. Augustine Presbytery, which can be found on our church's website: www.1stpres-fb.com. The overture addresses "Authoritative Interpretations" and how they function in the life of the greater church. While there are a host of overtures that exist which address the several issues facing the PC (USA) today, few of them effectively speak to the future of our church from a constitutional perspective. In accepting this overture, I believe that we are offering an effective constitutional option and are doing so in a hopeful and supportive manner.

Friends, when we put our trust in Christ, we begin to see the world as God sees the world. When we allow Christ's Spirit to pervade our lives, our living begins to look somewhat incarnational inasmuch as we bear witness to the mission of God and allow the light of Christ to penetrate the even darkest corners of our lives. There is always hope when it comes to God's future! Oh, it may appear to be a bit uncertain from time to time, but as Corrie Ten Boom once said, "Never be afraid to trust an unknown future to a known God."

Isaiah teaches, "So shall my word be

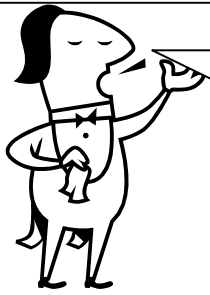
A Book Review

Biblical Foundations for Small Group Ministry, *by Gareth Icenogle*

Throughout the introduction and section one of his book, Icenogle makes some very good points that help us understand the theological tuning of small groups, an idea which he claims as the purpose of his book. He talks of covenants and uses instances in the Bible to support the theory of a covenant as that which exists for a community. For example, Icenogle would argue that God's covenant with Abraham had to do not just with Abraham but many others as well; thus, the covenant component for small groups is that God is going to be with the group. Icenogle encourages small groups to not only be supportive of their own members but also to have an impact on the outside world through their behavior and relationships.

In addition to his 10 commandments for small groups, Icenogle offers guidelines and detailed explanations to indicate how a small group can deepen its communication skills. Some of his suggestions are as follows: move from cliché conversation to reporting the facts; share one's ideas and opinions; share feelings, values, and emotions; and finally share personal confessions. Icenogle argues that, when a group grows closer together, these levels of interpersonal sharing can occur.

Icenogle keeps the reader focused on the importance of building relationships and establishing a clear mission or task, a goal which he believes is vital for small group success. He elaborates in great detail upon the inclusion of men and women as well as the proper use of time and talents. Leadership, Icenogle argues, centers around the concept of having a strong sense of direction: not an overbearing style that kills but a style that gives life and empowers the group members. Identifying and appointing leaders and giving them a structure they can work in enables the group to be led by its members as they grow in respect and knowledge of each other and of the mission itself.

So What Should We Think of Hell?

Contemplations about hell don't seem to make front page news anymore. Modern reflections and interpretations regarding that place are more often found in movie theaters than in worship services. The sting of some of the tragic imagery contained within Dante's *Divine Comedy* seems to have been lost over time.

Why is that? Oh, we may presume to be on a different level than that of medieval theologians who would have located hell somewhere beneath the earth, and, indeed, we are. Even John Calvin, however, while recognizing the limits of such literal and sadistic talk of dungeons, etc., is nevertheless insistent that "these forms of speech denote, in a manner suited to our feeble capacity, a dreadful torment, which no man can now comprehend and no language can express."

Perhaps we steer clear of talking about hell because, as Mark Achtemeier, assistant professor of systematic theology at Dubuque Theological Seminary, has pointed out, "The apostles didn't go out preaching, 'You'll burn in hell unless you repent.' That is not what came first in the Biblical witness." Nevertheless, as theologian William Placher asserts, "We've fallen into the modern heresy that we're all basically pretty good people who don't need punishment. If we really thought more about our sin – if we really thought about people starving around the world while we're living in the midst of plenty – we'd worry more about God's grace to forgive us."

Consider carefully the phrase "God's grace to forgive us." In those few and simple words we witness the very tension that exists between grace versus judgment, love versus justice, subjects which must be part of any thoughtful discussion about hell. Dr. Tom Ascol, executive director of Founders Ministries, says, "By God's grace those of us who are trusting Christ have been rescued from this horrible destiny."

Hell may not be the first concept we talk about when we share with people the good news about the gift of grace freely given by God through Jesus Christ; however, our sharing of the gospel must of necessity include the sober realization of the consequences of our sin, a call for a deliberate determination to change, and result in a celebration of the Christ through whom our sins are forgiven.

Alexa Smith, associate for the Presbyterian News Service in Louisville, Ky., offers this parting word on the matter of hell: "What we can know for certain is that God's grace is as real as God's judgment – and just as incomprehensible. If we can say at least this much with conviction, then maybe scared [Christians] who wonder about hell won't have to look just to Dante for help." No, our help is in no other than Jesus Christ, and our judge is also our redeemer! Thanks be to God!

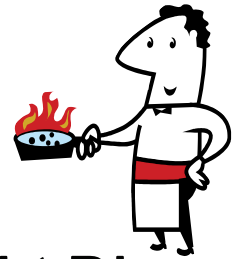


